


How do you think we can make our school a better place? Our School Councillors are always ready to listen. So, if you have any ideas, don't forget to speak to them.





LEARNING HIGHLIGHTS



Year 5

Year 5 have been studying the Anglo-Saxons. They have recently welcomed a visitor who took them back in time to the Middle Ages! Our children were given the task of building a home out of straw and mud and even had to march to the King to pay taxes! This was a wonderful experience for the children and their teachers were particularly impressed with the amount of vocabulary they learned.

Our Year 3 children have been learning about The Stone Age. This is a period of prehistory, which ended approximately 5000 years ago, in which humans used primitive stone tools. You may remember seeing a large tent camped out on our field a couple of weeks ago. These visitors camped overnight, living similarly to how people would have done in The Stone Age. They also delivered a Stone Age workshop to our Year 3 children. This gave them a real insight into how stone was used and how people survived during this historical period.



LEARNING HIGHLIGHTS



READING UPDATE

"Children who are good at reading do more of it: they learn more, about all sorts of things, and their expanded vocabulary, gained from their reading, increases their ease of access to more reading."

Reading continues to be a firm priority at Mayespark. Here are some of the recent changes we have made to help ensure every child develops the reading skills necessary to achieve in life.



This term, we have introduced a reading framework in Years 3-6 called **Destination Reader**. Through this structure we are explicitly teaching the following skills: predication, clarifying, summarising, inference, questioning, evaluating and making connections. We are confident that this approach will help us to accelerate children's progress in reading and encourage them to foster a life-long love of reading.

To help ensure all children are reading books at an appropriate level, we have now moved to using colour banded books for every child across the school. There are now in excess of 200 additional books for children to choose from in each year group. All children are expected to read their school banded book at least 6 times every week and complete their reading record.





Our Senior Leaders regularly monitor children's reading records. Thank you to everyone who reads regularly at home.


